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INDIA SIMPLIFIES DRUG IMPORT RULES TO ACCELERATE RESEARCH AND PHARMACEUTICAL INNOVATION

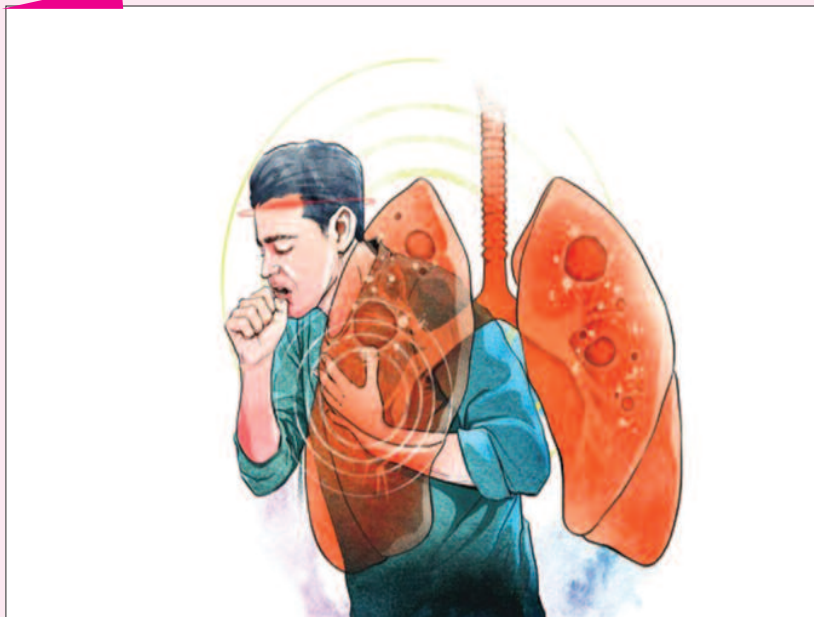

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HEAVY RAINFALL ALERT ISSUED ACROSS LARGE PARTS OF INDIA

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has issued a widespread rainfall alert covering several states as the southwest monsoon continues its advance across the country.
